
To use the game of ice hockey to teach life skills and empower marginalized youth.

Hockey Education Reaching Out Society (HEROS) is a volunteer driven charity that uses the game of ice hockey to teach life-skills and empower Canada's marginalized youth.

Programs support a player's life journey by focusing on the four core HEROS behaviours: Listening, Respect, Discipline, and Having Fun. These core values give players the tools they need to navigate the challenges they face in their day-to-day lives and allow them to translate their on-ice lessons into off-ice success.

By participating in HEROS, players build meaningful relationships with their dedicated volunteer mentors, as well as their HEROS teammates. They are given access to sport training, personal and educational development opportunities, and post-secondary exploration, all while enjoying the thrill of playing hockey.

OUR PROGRAMS CONT.



Future Stars/All Stars

The *Future Stars* program (grades 4-8) introduces our youngest players to the game of hockey and the four HEROS behaviours: **Listening, Respect, Discipline, and Have Fun!**

Our *All Stars* program (grades 8 and higher) includes players who have grown, developed, and moved up from Future Stars, as well as new at risk youth participants looking for an opportunity to play hockey. Our focus is to introduce our older HEROS players to responsibility, respect, and mentoring experiences that help prepare them for adulthood.

For both programs, everything required to play hockey is provided completely free, including hockey gear, transportation, ice-time, off-ice support, and snacks. Players form mentor relationships with volunteers and other HEROS players, as well as receive life-skills training.

HEROS International

In 2008, HEROS began sharing its passion for hockey beyond the Canadian border. We partnered with social workers in both Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland to bring local marginalized youth together in promotion of mutual understanding and co-operation.

This cross-border initiative has since grown from a one-week residential hockey camp to a 6-month youth development program. Participants are selected every January and begin work in their home communities; taking part in activities focused on communication, leadership, and understanding.





SuperHEROS

SuperHEROS is open to youth ages 7-17 with cognitive and physical challenges and like all HEROS programs, is completely free.

We provide adapted on-ice curriculum focusing on station work from a Learn to Play perspective.

We also provide players with opportunities to share the hockey experience with fellow HEROS and youth from other communities. Participants are supported every step of the way by a dedicated team of volunteer mentors who provide support on and off the ice.

HEROS 2023-2024 HIGHLIGHTS



Breaking Barriers

HEROS has joined together with the First Nations Health
Consortium of Alberta and Hockey Alberta, with the support of
Hockey Alberta Foundation, to deliver street hockey programming
to remote First Nations communities! This pilot project is designed
to get young people moving, working together, and building
important life skills such as teamwork, creativity, and resilience
through street hockey.

The programming aims to make hockey as inclusive as possible, bringing everything kids need to play, right to their communities. The accessibility of this program, combined with HEROS' inclusive, hockey-based mentorship programming ensures that young people in remote communities will be able to play hockey with their friends and mentors regardless of the barriers they face in their day-to-day lives.

Air Canada Fan Flights

This season, six players – each from different HEROS cities – were selected to participate in the Air Canada Fan Flight program, where they were provided the opportunity to travel to Nashville, Las Vegas, and New York to watch their favourite NHL team play an away game. Thanks to Air Canada, our HEROS families were provided with their travel, accommodations, meals, and tickets to the games, not to mention special visits from NHL coaches and players, creating special moments that they never thought possible.



Since 2018, Air Canada Foundation has supported HEROS' fundraising efforts, flown players and coaches to multiple Willie O'Ree All-Star Weekends, helped bring equipment to HEROS players in Belfast, Northern Ireland, and awarded seventeen players and one coach Air Canada Fan Flight experiences!



SuperHEROS Spring Friendship Series

HEROS was proud to host the inaugural SuperHEROS Spring Friendship Series from March 29-31, 2024! The tournament brought together SuperHEROS from Calgary, Edmonton, Regina, and Winnipeg, as well as players from local hockey teams and HEROS chapters. Six teams participated, all made up of SuperHEROS from different chapters, providing players the chance to play alongside new and old teamates alike! The event was a resounding success thanks to the hard work and dedication of the SuperHEROS

community, which included an incredible fundraiser hosted by Jeff Parry and his hockey team, the Gammy Grinders.

In 2018, the launch of the first SuperHEROS program broke barriers for young people and their families as there was nowhere in Western Canada for players living with physical or cognitive barriers to play the game in a safe and inclusive environment. Now, six years later, we couldn't be more grateful for all those who made this event possible!



Hockey in the Harbour

On September 14th, HEROS was thrilled to see an incredible group of partners, donors, and volunteers for another fantastic year of Hockey in the Harbour, with this year's event being presented by NexGen Energy Ltd.

Once again, the event was held at the stunning Pipe Shop in North Vancouver, bringing together so many friends from the HEROS community, all in the hopes of making an impactful contribution to help marginalized youth across

the country. This year, over \$120,000 was raised, with CIBC Wood Gundy's Vancouver Park Place office – one of HEROS longest standing supporters – leading the charge and committing an incredible \$20,000 contribution for HEROS programs across Canada this season.

Hockey in the Roundhouse

Emulating the evening of inspiration that is Hockey in the Harbour, this past season saw HEROS add another signature event to the calendar with the inaugural Hockey in the Roundhouse on November 16th. Hosted at the Steam Whistle Roundhouse in downtown Toronto, the event welcomed some of Toronto's best and brightest professionals, alongside HEROS volunteers, donors, and partners. Guests were given the opportunity to enjoy some incredible company



and listen to powerful storytelling from award winning broadcasters Harnarayan Singh, Elliotte Friedman, and Rob Kerr, while also hearing first-hand accounts of the impact their support will have on HEROS players. In total \$130,000 was raised through this event, and we can't thank our generous guests, event sponsors, and volunteers enough for their support!

HEROS IN THE COMMUNITY

Be A Budd



This season, the IHD team, in partnership with both Brenden Dillon of the Winnipeg Jets and Kyle Burroughs of the San Jose Sharks, raised \$7,500 through their camps, ensuring their local HEROS chapter has all the resources they need to help players find success.



VOLUNTEER IMPACT STORY



Half a World Away: A Volunteer's Story

Tatum Amy, a professional hockey player and HEROS Volunteer Coordinator, has one of those small-town, Canadian hockey stories that you would think came straight out of a CBC film. Born and raised in Birtle, Manitoba, playing hockey from an early age wasn't even a question in her house. As Tatum says, "My town really only had a grocery store, a gas station, and an arena, so for my parents, putting me in hockey was an easy decision and I fell in love with the sport immediately."

When she arrived at Mount Royal University in 2017, it didn't take long before Tatum was recruited by her teammates, Rachel Piitz and Anna Purschke, to help them out on Thursday afternoons

at HEROS' Forest Lawn chapter. Tatum still remembers her first day, saying, "I felt so excited about the experience and just so welcomed by everyone at the program, even as a volunteer." That feeling never faded, and Tatum stuck with her friends at HEROS and SuperHEROS over her six years at MRU, being an important part of their growth and development, and building strong relationships with the players and other volunteers.

In March of 2023, Tatum's time at MRU was coming to an end, but her skills and drive had her setting her sights on going pro. With the changing landscape in women's professional hockey, she wasn't sure where she was headed, until a friend mentioned a chance to play with Leksands IF of the Swedish Women's Hockey League. This was an incredible opportunity for Tatum to play the game she loves while living in a new and exciting place, but it also meant that she wouldn't be able to skate with her friends at HEROS and SuperHEROS each week. So, after six years of watching the players grow, she would have to say goodbye to the incredible young people she had come to know so well – or so she thought.

Many past players and volunteers have found creative ways to stay connected to HEROS, even when they can't be at the rink. Some host fundraisers for their local chapter, others provide volunteer or work experience opportunities for HEROS alumni. For Tatum, staying connected meant taking on the coordination of HEROS volunteers by reviewing applications and ensuring players have the right mentors to help them play, learn, and grow. Through this role, Tatum has helped HEROS players so much over the past year, as volunteers are the most crucial component to the delivery of all HEROS programs. "Moving this far away, knowing I'm still part of HEROS is so special to me. Being able to be connected somehow, even though it's not on the ice, is super important," said Tatum.

Tatum has highlighted how important the "Once a HERO, always a HERO" mantra is. She's travelled more than 7,000 kilometres from where she first stepped on the ice at a HEROS practice but continues delivering a lasting impact to the youth who need it most, and also knows that the entire HEROS community is there for her whenever she needs it.

HEROS IMPACT STORY

Never Alone: Jordan's HEROS Journey

When Jordan first put on a HEROS jersey, she admits that she didn't even know how to skate. Amazingly, it wasn't long before the HEROS Winnipeg player found herself facing the Great One. "Wayne Gretzky stood in the goal, and I got a slap shot on him," said Jordan. "I've never been more excited to get a goal." Meeting and skating with a hockey legend while participating in the 2016 NHL Heritage Classic in Winnipeg has become one of her most cherished stops on what has been a memorable HEROS path.

"I don't know where I'd be without HEROS," said Jordan, who is now a HEROS All-Star. "They gave me the opportunity to learn and play hockey when I couldn't. They gave me a place to go when I was struggling. They taught me so much about respect and responsibility that I didn't even consider."

Off the ice, like many of her teammates across the country, Jordan has faced many challenging day-to-day obstacles. A true HERO, Jordan doesn't let challenges define her. Over the years, she has learned to lean on her HEROS teammates, coaches, and mentors, who have provided her with tools to continue to work hard and achieve her goals. Even in her most challenging moments, she has turned to the positive experience of HEROS for comfort.

"I love to put my headphones on and picture being on the ice. Hockey was always my escape, my joy in life. I love it," said Jordan. Now, she is looking forward to trying out for her high school hockey team and sharing her experience with younger HEROS as they join the program.

As part of a player's path through HEROS, they're given the responsibility to mentor their younger peers as they begin their own journeys through the program. All-Stars like Jordan take Future Stars under their wing, helping build their mentee's confidence and self-worth, while sharing the lessons they've learned through HEROS along the way.

"I've been taught skills by people I got close to in the program," said Jordan. "I got taught hockey skills and now get to teach those skills to other kids."

Jordan's first piece of advice to her younger teammates as they lace up their skates for the first time is simple: "Once a HERO, always a HERO. We're all here to support you and help you become the best player and person you can be. You're never alone and us HEROS will always have your back."


